You must visit the Cascade County Elections Office at 325 2nd Ave. North Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, before Election Day, and 7:00 am to 8:00 pm on Election Day to reregister and to vote. If you did receive a mail ballot, make sure it is returned by

November 7th. If it is too late to mail, drop off at the election office. The ballot box is out again inside the front entrance door.

A hero to his people, a villain to many English Canadians, Louis Riel spent five years from 1879 to 1884 in exile in Montana before his death by hanging for leading the Red River Rebellion of 1885. LEWIS & CLARK EXPEDITION: The Island Range Chapter of Wild Montana presents the following program on **Thursday, November 9th** at **6:30 pm** in the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center auditorium, 4201 Giant Springs Road. A typical day's hiking and rowing by the Lewis and Clark expedition would exhaust today's hardy outdoors folks. But the captains and crew members did it daily in little-known territory for over two years.

Retired history teacher, Lewis and Clark expert, and member of the Lewis and Clark Honor Guard, Norman Anderson will describe the physical rigors the explorers faced in their 1804 to 1806 journey. In the presentation, Anderson will highlight a few of the explorers' wildest experiences while taking a month to portage around five waterfalls in the current Great Falls area. He'll also highlight some hikes that people can take in the Great Falls area today in the footsteps of Lewis and Clark.

VETERAN'S DAY: The ceremony will begin at **11:00** am on **Saturday, November 11th** at the Montana Veteran's Memorial, 1009 25th Street North. It coincides with other holidays including <u>Armistice Day</u> and <u>Remembrance</u>

<u>Day</u> which are commemorated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of <u>World War I</u>. Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 when the <u>Armistice with</u>

<u>Germany</u> went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.
