**NEW CITY COMMISSION: January 2nd** will see a new City Commission seated. Mayor Cory Reeves takes the lead with new Commissioner Shannon Wilson, and Commissioners Joe McKenney, Susan Wolff and Rick Tryon. Commissioner Tryon was re-elected in November and starts a new four-year term.

**BOOKWORMS UNITED BOOK CHALLENGE:** The Great Falls Public Library has started a new reading challenge for 2024 starting **January 2nd**. It's open to all residents of Cascade County who own a library card. The library has culled a list of categories for people to read from, and each person who reads one book per category and one category per book for a total of 50 books by **December 27**, 2024 will eligible for a prize to be announced at a later date.

People can pick up a reading log at the library or download the PDF <u>here</u> to track

their progress. Some of the categories include "200 pages or fewer," "Published in 2024," "Written by a Josephine Miles Award Winner," "Science Fiction" "Book You Abandoned in the Past," and "Book About a Real Person," among others.

We also have compiled an online list of recommended books with a short description for each book for several of the categories: <u>Anthologies</u>, <u>Art or Craft</u>, <u>Business/Marketing/Entrepreneurship</u>, <u>Most Challenged Books</u>, <u>Civil Rights</u>, <u>Classics You've Been Avoiding</u>, <u>Environmental</u>, <u>Genre Bending</u>, <u>Magic</u>, <u>Native Author</u>, <u>Authors with a Pen Name</u>, <u>Books about Revenge</u>, <u>Science Fiction</u>, <u>Spooky Books</u>, and <u>Transportation Books</u>.

To earn the prize for completing the challenge, one must submit their completed log to the library by **December 28** for staff to verify. Books read for other reading programs, book clubs, or assignments can be counted toward the challenge, provided they fit into the categories. Books in print, audio and electronic formats all will be accepted for the challenge. A MONTANAN ON A MISSION: Eamon Ormseth will give a presentation at Central Christian Church (1025 Central Ave.) on January 3rd, 6:30 pm, and at the Great Falls Public Library on January 4th, 6:30 pm in the Cordingley Room. Ormseth will talk about his year living in Beit Jala teaching English in a Palestinian Lutheran school from 2017 to 2018. Beit Jala is a town of about 13,500 people in the West Bank, just south of Jerusalem.

During his presentation, he will share his thoughts about the prospects for peace in Palestine/Israel, answer relevant questions about the current situation, and provide resources to learn more about the area. Ormseth said the talk is

grounded in his personal experience in the area. Before his mission, Ormseth studied History and Central and Southwest Asian Studies at the University of Montana. He's also served as an associate with Opportunity Palestine, whose mission is to sustain the educational institutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) through development and awareness building.

**HATE AND EXTREMISM IN MONTANA:** What we as a community need to know to stand against HATE. Tuesday, **January 16th**, Church of the Incarnation, 600 3rd Ave. North.

Panelists will present history of Hate and Extremism in Montana and Current Hate and Extremism activities in the state and nation as well as Montana State Legislature connections and bills that promoted Hate and Extremism. Audience will be welcome to ask questions.

The hard-right movement mobilized Hate and Extremism from the mainstream to the main street in recent years. On January 6, 2021 the nation watched as our Capitol was attacked by Extremist groups. Since that time, we have seen the antisemites, conspiracy theorists and white nationalists welcomed by government officials. Great Falls and the state of Montana have seen the spread of hate literature in our communities. We are seeing Hate and Extremist groups everywhere: people's homes, schools, doctors' offices, libraries, bars,

restaurants, churches and other community spaces. The fear of the great replacement is spreading throughout our city. Great Falls Rising feels strongly that our community needs to be informed about what is happening and who these groups are. Unfortunately, some of our elected officials have connections to these groups. Join us for a critical discussion on Hate and Extremism in Montana.

STORYTELLERS OF MONTANA: The Power to Connect Our World with documentarian Lailani Upham. January 18th, 7:00 pm, Great Falls Public Library. Using her experience working on the documentary film projects The Sixty-Four Flood and The Blackfeet Flood, Lailani Upham leads participants through a discussion on the creative and healing process of storytelling. Upham is an Amskapi Pikuni (Blackfeet Nation) tribal member, along with Aaniiih, Nakoda, Dakota tribal descent and an adventure explorer, photographer, videographer, writer, and storyteller who travels throughout Montana to tell stories from an Indigenous perspective. She also is on the board of directors for the Freeflow Foundation, a non-profit organization based in Missoula, Montana, that delivers opportunities for creativity, space, and access to wild places for writers, artists, and leaders of all backgrounds. She also is an advisory board member for The Common Ground Project, based in Yellowstone.

In her two films, survivors on the Blackfeet Reservation told firsthand, historical accounts nearly 50 years after a tragic flood took lives and homes in the worst natural disaster in Montana history. Upham discusses how the documentary story connected our world. This program will offer engaging discussion on untold stories and understandings.

**GFPS SUPERINTENDENT SEARCH:** Great Falls Public Schools has opened a community survey for feedback as the district begins its search for a new superintendent. Gordon Johnson, school board chair, said the responses will help the board know what qualities the community is looking for in the new superintendent. The minimum requirements for the superintendent are a masters degree or better in school administration, a valid Montana administrator's certification with appropriate administrative endorsements upon hire and at least five years of experience in school administration. State law requires that school systems with 31 or more full time licensed staff employ a full-time licensed superintendent "who shall devote full time to administration and supervision."

**EXTREMIST BEHAVIOR SPREADS IN GREAT FALLS:** Great Falls Rising and Big Sky 55+ Board of Directors Member Pam Carroll wrote an important oped about the election difficulties in Great Falls. It was published in the <u>Helena</u>

<u>Independent Record</u>, <u>Butte's Montana Standard</u>, the Billings Gazette, The Missoulian, and The Daily Montanan. Read her Op-Ed article:

On Tuesday, December 12, 2023, the Grinch revealed itself in Great Falls, Montana. I saw the mean-spirited character manifested in citizens of Cascade County.

Cascade County Commission held their bimonthly meeting at the Expo Park in anticipation of large public attendance. Commissioner Joe Briggs brought forth a resolution to remove election duties from the Clerk and Recorder. This resolution has been talked about for several years.

Public comments were heard from over one hundred people, with many more in attendance to witness the spectacle of vile and spiteful testimony. This went on for seven long and excruciating hours.

As I sat in the audience listening to the public comments, I was so ashamed of the behavior of those speaking in opposition to the resolution. These are my neighbors who used threats, yelled, and told outright lies. The Bible quotes were thrown out over and over to attack commissioners Joe Briggs and Jim Larson. Two pastors in our community spewed hateful words. Not once did I hear these so-called church attending people speak to the call to love thy neighbor as thyself. It was like watching school yard bullies and toddler temper tantrums. Never in the 62 years that I have lived in Great Falls have I ever experienced anything like the hateful actions and words that I saw that day. I fought back tears of sadness that day for my community.

The restraint shown by Commissioners Joe Briggs, Jim Larson and those that spoke in support of the resolution is to be commended. Supporters spoke with decorum and integrity while expressing their concerns for the election process that has been flawed since Clerk and Recorder Sandra Merchant has taken office. They stuck to the facts and kept religion and emotion out of their testimony.

We are in need of change in Great Falls and around Montana as this type of extremist behavior spreads and basic community norms around public discussion and debate dissolve. Perhaps, the most disturbing aspect is the appeal to theocratic ideals which could not be more un-American. This country was founded on a fundamental separation between church and state, and we have upheld that value, embodied in the First Amendment to the Constitution, for

almost 250 years. The opponents' dogmatic appeal to a narrow-minded, intolerant brand of Christianity would be ridiculous if it were not so fundamentally dangerous and unconstitutional.

There is hard work ahead for all reasonable people of goodwill in this community and across Montana to try to bring us back to a semblance of decency and behavioral norms of civility and respect necessary for the community to not only survive but thrive. "Love thy Neighbor no Exception."
