**GROWTH POLICY COMMITTEE:** The City of Great Falls is kicking off the updating process for the Growth Policy Plan. Your voices will be the driving force behind creating the roadmap for the future, shaping decisions and regulations to reflect our shared values and aspirations.

- Created to provide feedback and input throughout the process, start to finish.

NO MORE VIOLENCE WEEK: April 8th through the 12th. This is the first year that No More Violence Week is partnering with the statewide Child Abuse and Neglect (CAN) Conference for daytime trainings. PLEASE DO <u>register</u> for the CAN Conference if you plan to attend daytime sessions! When you register using the NoMore Violence Week registration option is selected, the fee will be waived.

The concluding celebration for Threads of Connection and NoMore Violence Week will be held on **Friday**, **April 12th** at Paris Gibson Square Museum of Art from **5:30 to 7:00 pm**. More than 700 quilt squares have been created by community members sharing their commitment to prevention of violence and made into quilts that will be on display.

No More Violence was founded in 2015 by Dr. Cherie McKeever and students at Great Falls College-MSU in response to an increased recognition of violence against children and families in our community. A week of awareness events was their coordinated response to "do something" positive. These initial efforts have grown into a tremendous legacy of what is now known as No More Violence Week. Today, No More Violence Week occurs during the month of April in Great Falls, Montana, and includes a full week of free training, awareness building activities, and community events for all ages. Through partnerships with more than 20 community organizations, this week addresses challenging topics - child abuse, intimate partner violence, family violence, trauma, human trafficking, missing and murdered indigenous people, addiction, suicide, mental health, isolation and more - in a spirit of collaboration, partnership, growth, hope and unity. **EARTH DAY:** Every year on **April 22nd**, Earth Day marks the anniversary of the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970. Let's take a look at the last half-century of mobilization for action.

## The Origins of Earth Day

In the decades leading up to the first, Americans were consuming vast amounts of leaded gas through massive and inefficient automobiles. Industry belched out smoke and sludge with little fear of the consequences from either the law or bad press. Air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. Until this point, mainstream America remained largely oblivious to environmental concerns and how a polluted environment threatens human health.

However, the stage was set for change with the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller Silent Spring in 1962. The book represented a watershed moment, selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries as it raised

public awareness and concern for living organisms, the environment and the inextricable links between pollution and public health.

Senator Gaylord Nelson, the junior senator from Wisconsin, had long been concerned about the deteriorating environment in the United States. Then in January 1969, he and many others witnessed the ravages of a massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the student anti-war movement, Senator Nelson wanted to infuse the energy of student anti-war protests with an emerging public consciousness about air and water pollution. Senator Nelson announced the idea for a teach-in on college campuses to the national media, and persuaded Pete McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman, to serve as his co-chair.

Senator Gaylord Nelson recruited Denis Hayes, a young activist, to organize the campus teach-ins and to scale the idea to a broader public, and they choose April 22, a weekday falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, to maximize the greatest student participation.

## First Earth Day, 1970

Recognizing its potential to inspire all Americans, Hayes built a national staff of 85 to promote events across the land and the effort soon broadened to include a wide range of organizations, faith groups, and others. They changed the name to Earth Day, which immediately sparked national media attention, and caught on across the country. Earth Day inspired 20 million Americans — at the time, 10% of the total population of the United States — to take to the streets, parks and auditoriums to demonstrate against the impacts of 150 years of industrial development which had left a growing legacy of serious human health impacts.
